GENERAL INTERNET-SAFETY INFORMATION FOR TEENS

Learn about the Internet.

- Recognize that predators can find very personal information on you strictly by tracking what websites you visit.
- Even by commenting on someone else's page or message board, a potential molester or identity thief can find out who you are, who you know, and where you live.

Regarding personal webpage services including MySpace, Facebook, Live Journal, Xanga, and blogspot:

- Check your account settings so that only people you have added as friends can see your profile.
- Only add people to your friends list if you have established a friendship in real life before seeing them online.

Keep your identity private.

- Be careful of how much personal information you list about yourself in the hobbies/interests/personality/location/school part of your profile.
- Online predators and identity thieves can easily determine who you are and where you live by utilizing readily available online services/programs to piece together bits of information about you.

Never get together with someone you "meet" online.

• You can never know for sure if the people you talk to online are who they say they are.

Never respond to email, chat comments, instant messages, or newsgroup messages that are hostile, belligerent, inappropriate, or make you feel uncomfortable in any way.

- It's not your fault that you received the message.
- Ignore the sender because responding will only encourage the person.
- If you feel threatened by any such message, you can call the tip line of the Pima County Attorney's Office at 88-CRIME or report it with
